With faculty advisement, concentrations are available in Video Production, Broadcast Journalism, Digital and Interactive Media, and Electronic Publishing.

Cayuga is the only community college to reach the finals (our students have done so three times) and win a top award (music video category) in the National Collegiate Broadcasters competitions. With hands-on training in professional facilities, students learn to perform management, production, operations, and announcing functions. The program includes work in the College's FM stereo radio station and broadcast-quality color television studio. Internships at area organizations are a required component of the curriculum.
