
Cayuga's Criminal Justice program provides a strong foundation for employment and advancement in the fields of law enforcement and corrections, and for transfer to a four-year institution.

Criminal Justice: Police students explore components of the justice system, trace the history of common law, the development of case law in the U.S., and learn the organizational, social, functional, and administrative roles and responsibilities within the field.

Successful students will possess a working knowledge of New York Penal Law, study the causes of crime, understand factors related to delinquency, and develop the ability to prepare evidence for court procedures.

Students should be aware that entrance into most law enforcement fields demands civil service exams, certain physical requirements, and includes an extensive background investigation.

This program is designed for students who plan to transfer to a bachelor's degree program and continue studies in criminal justice, law, pre-law, criminology or forensic psychology. By utilizing free electives, students can build a concentration in criminal justice while fulfilling general education and liberal arts requirements.

If you plan to transfer to a bachelor's degree program, you should consult with your prospective school to determine the appropriate course selection for optimum transfer of credits.
