# Support to the College

The Foundation provides support to the College in two forms: 1) scholarships, awards and grants to students and 2) support for academic and other College and community programs. The Foundation was fortunate to have another banner year of gifts and grants from many generous individuals, foundations and organizations.

#### SUPPORT TO STUDENTS


In this fiscal year there were several new endowed commencement awards and scholarships established.

- The estate of Ruth Edwards Carpenter provided a gift to establish the Ruth Edwards Carpenter Memorial Award. This will be given annually to a graduate who intends to continue his/her education at Syracuse University in the field of medicine, nursing or health care and who has demonstrated excellence in his/her field.
- The Samuel and Bertha Schwartz Foundation created the Vincent M. Klein Scholarship to honor their long-serving manager. Mr. Klein started at that foundation from its beginning in 1951 and remained until the spring of 2007. This scholarship will be awarded annually to a full-time incoming freshman, who is a graduate of a Cayuga County school and who plans to major in business. When the fund further profits, there will be two awards for freshmen—one for a female student and one for a male student.
- Martha S. MacKay, Associate Director of Development of the Foundation, former Foundation Board member and College Trustee, established the Verna Bench MacKay Memorial Scholarship in honor of her mother. This scholarship will be awarded annually to a nontraditional female student who is a full-time returning sophomore interested in being a teacher, preferably someone inclined to teach English.
- Five new **Trustee Scholarships** were created with one being funded by the members of the Board of Trustees. There were originally ten Trustee Scholarships, and the Trustees in collaboration with the Foundation felt the Fulton area schools should have five scholarships available. The funding for all but one of these scholarships comes from endowed or temporarily restricted scholarship funds.

#### The Foundation also provided:

- \$296,505 in scholarships and commencement awards to diminish some of the unmet need of over \$5.7 million.
- \$109,000 in generous annual donations from foundations, including the Allyn Foundation, D. E. French Foundation, the Frances C. and Albert C. Knight Foundation, and the Stanley W. Metcalf Foundation. Further support came from alumni, faculty, staff, businesses, organizations, trusts and memorial gifts.

# <u>Support to the College</u>

### PROGRAM SUPPORT

Program Support to Faculty, Staff, and Our Community:

- Instructional Equipment in the amount of \$49,214 was provided from two endowed funds to purchase multiple pieces of hand-held equipment and practice mannequins for the nursing department; a new computer system, turbo hard disk A-V recorder and other pieces of equipment for the Telecommunications program; overhead screen and tool storage for the Mechanical Technology Program; and a treadmill and elliptical for the fitness center. This fund supplements the technology fee charged to each student with the promise of having state-of-the-art equipment available for the students.
- **The Library Collection Fund** provided the library with \$1,085 to purchase a set of books entitled *Great Events from History*.
- **Cultural Events** are annually made possible with funds from the Ruth P. Thomas Arts Fund, the Noreen and Michael J. Falcone lecture series and the Cultural Enrichment endowed fund.

The Foundation, in honor of the theatre renovation completion, was in receipt of a very generous donation from the Stardust Foundation to name the theatre the Irene A. Bisgrove Community Theatre. To honor the major donors to the *Community Partners Building for the Future* successfully met campaign, the Foundation staged a grand reopening of the theatre with the "Forbidden Broadway" musical. This hit musical pays very funny tribute to thirty shows in one hundred minutes. This show won a 2006 Tony Award for Excellence in the Theatre, is updated annually and has been running for 25 years in New York City. The new theatre was baptized with the majority of the seats filled; and following the production, a reception was held for the donors with the cast.

Special Project and Development Grants enabled faculty and staff members to attend conferences, classes and develop an abroad intersession program. Linda MacKay, Brenda Forrest and Linda Alfieri, Associate, Assistant and Professor respectively of Nursing, attended two different nursing conferences to learn the latest teaching methods pertaining to two entirely different subject matters. Mark Montgomery, Assistant Professor of English, attended the International Integrity Conference with plans on establishing an on-campus Academic Integrity Committee. Linda Alfieri, Nursing Professor, attended a conference, which dealt with the at-risk nursing student. Dr. Maryanne Felter, Professor of English, went to London to establish an intersession course entitled "Literary London." Dr. Patricia Gridley, Associate Professor of Early Childhood, attended a national conference on Early Childhood Accreditation Peer Review Training. This will be most valuable, since the college is planning on going through the accreditation process in the future. Jeffrey Shea, Math Specialist in the Academic Support Center, attended a conference on the Supplemental Instruction Model. The purpose of the model is to reduce the number of students who withdraw or fail courses, and leffrey hopes to start a pilot program on campus using it for Math 070. If it is successful, it will be used in other course offerings. Dr. Ronald Grube, Assistant Professor of Geography/History requested a grant to develop a Special Topics course in History in London, England in the International Studies Program. This project will permit Ron to learn more English history and geography to enhance the courses he teaches. He also wishes to continue his relationship with the Brook House College faculty and students, which started when he taught them GIS/Historical Geography on our campus. One summer fellowship was awarded to Brenda Forrest. Assistant Professor of Nursing, to develop computerized interactive learning activities using "learning guides" and Power Point presentations to follow along with the guides. This fellowship required much research, collaboration and time, but it will be most beneficial for the nursing students.

# Support to the College

### Emerson Chair, Stardust Grant Will Promote Entrepreneurship Ventures at CCC

In 2006 the CCC Foundation received a \$500,000 grant to establish the Fred L. Emerson Foundation, Inc. Endowed Chair in Enterprise and Innovation. This grant along with a five-year, \$1 million pledge from the Stardust Foundation of Central New York was the first "investment" in the College's Entrepreneurship Initiative. Cayuga is the nation's only community college to have created an endowed chair in "e-ship" and is quickly gaining national recognition in this field.

While "entrepreneurship" typically refers to new business development, Cayuga envisions e-ship as a broader concept which enhances both business and the communities we serve. Interim President Dr. Philip Gover noted in 2007 that "as students learn to pursue innovative, value-added thinking, they will focus on enhancing not only business revenue and profitability but also the quality of life in their community."

Entrepreneurship at Cayuga began when Dr. Gover and Thomas J. Paczkowski '72, Business Professor and Director of CCC's Business and Industry Center, had a conversation about opportunities related to entrepreneurship. Based on their work, then-President Dr. Dennis Golladay offered Paczkowski a sabbatical to research entrepreneurial initiatives. Tom consulted with business and educational experts in the field and drafted a proposed concept.

With the background provided by this work, the Emerson Foundation decided to make its \$500,000 grant in December 2006. Daniel Fessenden, Emerson Foundation executive director, stated "We believe strongly in Cayuga's vision and its capacity to develop meaningful academic offerings that will inspire and prepare students to take active roles in creating new business ventures."

Dr. Daniel Paul Larson, President of Cayuga Community College, later named Paczkowski as the first Emerson Endowed Chair. As Emerson Chair, Paczkowski will design an introductory course in entrepreneurship, a certificate program and concentrations within existing two-year degree programs. Future plans call for a start-up laboratory for student venture teams, a student enterprise competition, an entrepreneurship scholarship, a regional Entrepreneurship Hall of Fame, and outreach to BOCES and public schools.

As an offshoot of these initial efforts, the Stardust Entrepreneurial Institute was born. The Institute is a not-for-profit corporation overseen by a board of directors and headed by former Auburn mayor and current Foundation Director Guy Cosentino. The Stardust Institute was seeded in 2007 by a grant to the CCC Foundation of \$1 million over five years from the Stardust Foundation of Central New York. The Stardust Foundation was originally founded in Arizona by Auburn native Jerry Bisgrove who ran the Red Star Trucking Company for many years along with his brother Jack.

Cayuga's Entrepreneurship Initiative has gained national attention for the CCC Foundation. At the 2007 NACCE Conference in San Antonio, Dr. Larson accepted a special award recognizing the founding of the Emerson Chair. Also during 2006-07, New York State Senator Michael F. Nozzolio facilitated a report entitled *A Call to Action: A Blueprint for Our Region's Future*, which addresses the state of decline on our region and suggests innovative changes to push forward. Senator Nozzolio provided \$56,000 in start-up funding for Cayuga's e-ship project in early 2007.


President Larson is enthusiastic about Cayuga's Initiative as is Dr. Deborah Moeckel, Vice President of Academic/Student Affairs. Dr. Moeckel noted that "the Entrepreneurship project presents the College with many new educational opportunities for students and faculty alike. Professor Paczkowski's efforts to incorporate entrepreneurship concepts across the curriculum have borne considerable fruit so far and have made it possible for faculty in many disciplines to provide practical experiences which help to make their subject matter real for students."


### **CCC FOUNDATION**

- For the first time in its history, the Foundation's total assets exceeded \$10 million, making ours one of the largest community college foundations in the U.S. This includes permanently endowed assets of nearly \$6 million.
- The Development Committee's focus on planned giving began to bear fruit. We confirmed four new commitments from alumni and friends in 2006-07 and realized bequests of more than \$420,000 from the estate of Ruth Edwards Carpenter.
- On December 13, 2006 alumna, Foundation Director and College Trustee Pamela Kirkwood '84 served as keynote speaker at the December 2006 Recognition Ceremony (hosted by the ACC/CCC Alumni Association).
- On March 15, 2007 we hosted over 100 attendees to the reopening of the newly renamed Cayuga Café. Guest speakers included Assemblyman Gary Finch.
- On April 3 the Foundation welcomed ACC/CCC retirees back to campus for the first-ever "Foundation Fun Day." Retirees were greeted with a reception and given a tour of the Auburn campus.
- On April 23 a "Fulton Campus Appreciation Day" for employees was co-sponsored by the Foundation and the Alumni Association.
- We announced the close of the largest campaign in the Foundation's history. The Community Partners Building for the Future campaign raised \$2.053 million. On April 27 we celebrated the closure of the campaign along with the dedication of the Irene A. Bisgrove Community Theatre at CCC.
